REGULAR COMMITTEE BUSINESS

Budget Status Report – Maxine Coleman

Statement of Activities – April 2020 (Attachment 3)

Ms. Coleman reviewed budget status through April 20, 2020. Block Grant revenue is lower than projected. New this year, block grant is paid in reimbursement through billing. Expenditure for prevention are being charged to Block grant as PA2 funds are not yet received as of the date of the report. However, PA2 funds are now being received and future report will be adjusted to reflect those funds. Treatment funds are currently lower than anticipated and this is projected to continue. Overall SUD treatment is lower than expected. Healthy Michigan and Medicaid expenses are below expectations.

Mr. Storey requested clarification as to why PA2 funds have not yet been received. Ms. Coleman reported that second quarter payments were received in May. First quarter payments have been applied to COBO hall debt; the region receives funds for the remaining three quarters. Members discussed the distribution of PA2 funds in general and requested clarification related to first quarter PA2 funds being used to offset Cobo Hall debt. Ms. Coleman and Mr. Hofman will explore details around distribution methodology. Ms. VanDerKooi will investigate with regional SAPT Directors and will research details of the PA2 Act.

NEW BUSINESS

Review Strategic Plan

Each PIHP region in the state is required to submit a strategic plan to MDHHS OROSC. The LRE's plan has not been updated since 2014. The State has mandated a FY21 – FY24 plan be submitted by July 17, 2020. Plan will be presented to the LRE Board during their June meeting.

Stephanie reviewed the plan's logic model that will accompany the plan's narrative. The prevention model was developed in coordination with the region's eleven prevention providers. Prevention goals focus on areas such as reduction in marijuana use, underage drinking and use by older adults, and reduction in opioid-related deaths. Goals under Substance Use Treatment Services focus on improving access to SUD Treatment Services, improving continuity of care, and increasing recovery maintenance.

SUD Director Update – Stephanie VanderKooi

a. Talk Sooner Update - Due to the pandemic, implementation plans scheduled for March had to be redesigned to accommodate the stay-at-home order.

<u>REGIONAL UPDATES</u> – Greg Hofman, LRE CEO; Mark DeYoung Greg provided the following updates:

- Primary focus in the region has been on the COVID-19 Pandemic and ensuring that front-line staff are adequately protected while still being able to provide services.
- Services have primarily shifted to telehealth services and there is movement toward allowing telehealth services to continue in the future. Ottawa County has been compiling data related to the initial perspective on use of telehealth.
- Mr. Hofman has been meeting regularly with CMHSPs and Beacon Health Options.
 CMHs are working on re-engagement plans.
- Direct care wage (\$2/hour) have not yet been distributed
- The region is working to find ways to keep the provider network stable, both financially and programmatically.
- Negotiations with the state related to contract settlement have stalled due to COVID-19.
- System reform activity has also stalled as a result of the pandemic.
- FY2020 Financial projections are positive. The state revised the allocation model for FY20 and regional data collection improvements have been implemented. It is likely that there will be a slight surplus at the end of the year.
- LRE continues to work with Beacon Health Options on Managed Care functions.

LAKESHORE REGIONAL ENTITY SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER OVERSIGHT POLICY BOARD

CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

POLICY

It shall be the policy of the Lakeshore Regional Entity Substance Use Disorder Oversight Policy Board (the "Oversight Policy Board") to provide a means for any Covered Person to identify and report to the Oversight Policy Board any direct or indirect Financial Interest and any actual or potential Conflict of Interest and, based on that information, to permit the Oversight Policy Board to review such Financial Interests and Conflicts of Interest and provide a process for the Oversight Policy Board to follow when managing Conflicts of Interest, all in accordance with applicable law.

OBJECTIVE

The objective of this policy (the "Policy") is to provide an effective oversight process to protect the interests of the Oversight Policy Board when contemplating a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter that might benefit the private interest of an individual or another entity. The Policy accomplishes this objective by defining Conflict of Interest, identifying individuals subject to this Policy, facilitating the disclosure of actual and potential Conflicts of Interest and Financial Interests and setting forth procedures to manage Conflicts of Interest. This Policy is intended to supplement, but not replace, any applicable state or federal laws governing conflicts of interests in governmental entities.

SCOPE

Individuals covered under this Policy include all members of the Oversight Policy Board, who are collectively referred to in this Policy as "Covered Person(s)."

DUTIES OF COVERED PERSONS

1. Duty of Care.

Every Covered Person shall act in a reasonable and informed manner and perform his or her duties for the Oversight Policy Board in good faith and with the degree of care that an ordinarily prudent person would exercise under similar circumstances.

2. Duty of Loyalty.

Every Covered Person owes a duty of loyalty to act at all times in the best interest of the Oversight Policy Board and not in the interest of the Covered Person or any other entity or

person, other than the County whose board of commissioners appointed the Covered Person to the Oversight Policy Board.

3. <u>Conflicts of Interest.</u>

No Covered Person may participate in the approval, disapproval, or recommendation of the expenditure of funds for a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board, in which the Covered Person, the Covered Person's Family Member or an organization in which the Covered Person is serving as an officer, director, trustee or employee, has a Financial Interest. Covered Persons should avoid not only actual but the appearance of Conflicts of Interest as well. Every Covered Person shall:

- (a) Disclose all Financial Interests as set out below; and
- (b) Recuse himself/herself from discussing and/or voting on the approval, disapproval or recommendation of the expenditure of funds for any transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter in which he/she has a Financial Interest, and not be present when any such discussion or vote takes place.

DEFINITIONS

<u>Conflict of Interest</u>. A Conflict of Interest arises when a Covered Person participates or proposes to participate in the approval, disapproval or recommendation of the expenditure of funds for a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board, in which the Covered Person, the Covered Person's Family Member or an organization in which the Covered Person is serving as an officer, director, trustee or employee, has a Financial Interest.

<u>Family Member</u> means spouse, parent, children (natural or adopted), sibling (whole or half blood), father-in-law, mother-in-law, grandchildren, great grandchildren and spouses of siblings, children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and all step family members, and any person(s) sharing the same living quarters in an intimate, personal relationship that could affect decisions of the Covered Person in a manner that conflicts with this Policy.

<u>Financial Interest</u>. A Covered Person has a Financial Interest if he or she has, directly or indirectly, actually or potentially, through a business, investment or through a Family Member:

- (a) an actual or potential ownership, control or investment interest in, or serves in a governance or management capacity for, an entity involved in a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board for its approval or recommendation; or
- (b) an actual or potential compensation arrangement with any entity or individual involved in a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board for its approval or recommendation.

Compensation includes direct and indirect remuneration, in cash or in kind.

<u>Interested Person</u> is a Covered Person who has a Financial Interest.

PROCEDURES

1. <u>Duty to Disclose</u>

Each Covered Person has a duty to disclose to the Oversight Policy Board the existence of a Financial Interest and all related material facts.

2. <u>Disclosure of Financial Interests</u>

Each Covered Person shall submit in writing to the Oversight Policy Board's Chairperson an Annual Financial Interest Disclosure Statement (Attachment A) listing all Financial Interests and affirming compliance with the Conflict of Interest Policy. Each Covered Person shall update his/her Annual Financial Interest Disclosure Statement each year on the date designated by the Oversight Policy Board for updating, and promptly when any new Financial Interests or potential Conflicts of Interest arise. The Chairperson of the Oversight Policy Board shall review and become familiar with all submitted Financial Interest Disclosure Statements and updates in order to guide his/her conduct regarding the disclosed information. The Vice Chairperson of the Oversight Policy Board shall review and become familiar with the Financial Interest Disclosure Statement submitted by the Chairperson of the Oversight Policy Board.

The Oversight Policy Board may request that a Covered Person(s) appear before the Oversight Policy Board or submit written information to supplement or to answer questions regarding information disclosed on the Annual Financial Interest Disclosure Statement.

3. Addressing Financial Interests and Conflicts of Interest

An Oversight Policy Board member who has disclosed a Financial Interest or Conflict of Interest shall recuse himself/herself from discussing and/or voting on the approval, disapproval or recommendation of the expenditure of funds for the transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter in which he/she has a Financial Interest. The Oversight Policy Board member may not be present when any such discussion or vote on the matter is taking place.

4. **Policy Enforcement**

- (a) If the Oversight Policy Board has reasonable cause to believe that a Covered Person has failed to disclose actual or potential Financial Interests or Conflicts of Interest, the Oversight Policy Board shall inform the involved Covered Person of the basis for such belief, and afford the Covered Person an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.
- (b) If, after hearing the Covered Person's response and after making such further investigation as may be required, the Oversight Policy Board determines that the Covered Person has in fact failed to disclose and actual or potential Financial Interest or Conflict of Interest, the Oversight Policy Board shall take appropriate corrective action.

5. Records of Proceedings

The minutes of the Oversight Policy Board shall contain:

- (a) The names of Covered Persons who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a Financial Interest and the nature of the Financial Interest.
- (b) The names of all persons who were present for discussion and votes related to the transaction or arrangement involved in the Financial Interest, a summary of the content of the discussion and a record of any vote taken in connection with the matter.

6. Annual Financial Interest Disclosure Statement

- (a) Annually, on a date to be determined by the Oversight Policy Board, each Covered Person shall complete, sign and date a Financial Interest Disclosure Statement (see Attachment A). The Financial Interest Disclosure Statement affirms that the signor:
 - 1. Has received a copy of this Policy;
 - 2. Has read and understands this Policy;
 - 3. Has agreed to comply with this Policy;
- 4. Has disclosed on the Financial Interest Disclosure Statement all Financial Interests which the signor currently may have; and
- 5. Will update the information on the Financial Interest Disclosure Statement promptly should a new Financial Interest arise, by completing a new Financial Interest Disclosure Statement.

LEGAL AUTHORITIES

The Policy is based on the following legal authorities:

- Mental Health Code, 1974 PA 258, MCL 300.1001 to 300.2106
- 1978 PA 566, MCL 15.181 to 15.185 (incompatible public offices)
- 1968 PA 317, MCL 15.321 to 15.330 (contracts of public servants with public entities)

FINANCIAL INTEREST DISCLOSURE STATEMENT

Definitions

<u>Covered Person</u>. Covered Person means a member of the Oversight Policy Board.

<u>Conflict of Interest</u>. A Conflict of Interest arises when a Covered Person participates or proposes to participate in the approval or disapproval of a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board, in which the Covered Person, the Covered Person's Family Member or an organization in which the Covered Person is serving as an officer, director, trustee or employee, has a Financial Interest.

<u>Family Member</u> means a spouse, parent, children (natural or adopted), sibling (whole or half blood), father-in-law, mother-in-law, grandchildren, great grandchildren and spouses of siblings, children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and all step family members, wherever they reside, as any person(s) sharing the same living quarters in an intimate, personal relationship that could affect business decisions of the Covered Person in a manner that conflicts with this Policy.

<u>Financial Interest</u>. A Covered Person has a Financial Interest if he or she has, directly or indirectly, actually or potentially, through a business, investment or through a Family Member:

- (a) an actual or potential ownership, control or investment interest in, or serves in a governance or management capacity for, an entity involved in a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board for its approval or recommendation; or
- (b) an actual or potential compensation arrangement with any entity or individual involved in a transaction, arrangement, proceeding or other matter coming before the Oversight Policy Board for its approval or recommendation.

Compensation includes direct and indirect remuneration, in cash or in kind.





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Lakeshore Regional Entity Regional Trend Analysis






Alcohol Risk Factors High School Students - LRE Region Trend




Marijuana Risk Factors

Percent of High School Students Reporting the Following, LRE Region Trend




Prescription Drug Risk Factors

Percent of High School Students Reporting the Following, LRE Region Trend





Parental Attitudes Toward Drug Use

Percentage of High School Students who Report their Parents Feel Use of the Following is 'Not Wrong' or 'Only a Little Bit Wrong', LRE Region Trend




Tobacco AccessTobacco Retailer Compliance Rates, LRE Region Trend






Fatal Traffic Crash
Substance-Involved Crashes with a Fatality, LRE Region Trend




Mental Health and Suicide

Substance Use Disorder Director's Report-Oversight Policy Board- August 2020

- 1. Synar: We are in synar season with a total of 35 checks that our region needs to conduct in 6 of our 7 counties with local tobacco retailers (gas stations, vape shops, etc). This year is challenging with covid-19 and ensuring that our decoys and youth chaperones are safe and using proper ppe. Additionally, we have a challenge in that federal law states 21 to purchase tobacco products but our state law remains at 18 (this is very difficult for tobacco retailer to navigate). The state Synar coordinator did significant advocacy for Synar to be cancelled for this year due to covid-19, but the federal government is still requiring that these be conducted. The timeline was moved back one month to allow for the entire month of August to conduct our checks. Allegan and Muskegon counties have both completed their checks and 100% of the retailers passed! Next meeting the full report and results will be presented to this group.
- 2. SOR Grants: We have submitted our plans for carryforward funds and for SOR part 2 projects to the state. All have been approved and work on these projects can start October 1, 2020 lasting for two fiscal years. Prevention will focus efforts on Botvin's Life Skills with High School Students and offer Prime for Life. Treatment will continue to work on jail-based MAT services, transportation, treatment costs. Recovery services will continue to be offered in the expansion of recovery homes in the region.
- **3. Strategic plan:** was submitted on the due date of July 17, 2020. OROSC has indicated that in early September we will hear from them on if the plan is approved or needs further work.
- **4. Site Visits:** Women's Specialty Services (WSS) and Sud contracted prevention providers site reviews are currently taking place. All are being conducted virtually this year due to covid.
- 5. SUD Rate Group: This group has been trying to coordinate universal rates for SUD Residential Treatment. Several of our providers have been asking for rate increases. Significant research is being conducted and reviewed to determine if our rates are able to change to help ensure the field is able to provide robust services. The goal is to make changes effective next Fiscal Year which starts October 1, 2020.






Congress negotiated a deal that would raise discretionary spending caps by upwards of \$300 billion over two years. Included in this deal is increased funding for non defense discretionary priorities.


This bipartisan budget agreement dedicates funding to address the opioid and mental health crisis by \$6 billion dollars over the next two years. \$3 billion for FY18 and \$3 billion for FY19 is appropriated to combat the substance abuse epidemic, including enhanced state grants (with additional assistance for those states with the highest mortality rates and tribes), public prevention programs, and law enforcement activities related to substance abuse and mental health programs to address the opioid epidemic. Additionally, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) was appropriated \$1 billion for FY18 and \$1 billion for FY19 to support additional scientific research.


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
Admissions by Primary Drug - LRE Totals



















